Judicial and Court Security
Lessons Learned in the Time of COVID-19 and Domestic Terror

Hon. Thomas A. Delaney

...is a Superior Court Judge in Orange County, California, where he is Supervising Judge of the Collaborate Courts. He previously sat on the Unlimited Civil Panel in Santa Ana and, before that, he heard misdemeanor and felony trials at the Harbor Justice Center in Newport Beach. He is a member of the Court's Executive and Security Committees.

Judge Delaney is the 89th and current President of the California Judges Association, which represents more than 2200 active and retired judicial officers and appellate court justices from all 58 California counties. He also is an Advisory Member of the Judicial Council of California, a member of the Executive Board of the California Latino Judges Association and sits on the Governor's Judicial Selection Advisory Committee.

Before his appointment in 2014, Judge Delaney was a partner at Sedgwick LLP where he tried several jury trials and focused his practice on the defense of mass tort and individual product liability and specialty tort actions involving catastrophic physical injuries and psychological disorders, as well as employment and commercial cases.

Timm F. Fautsko

...is a court management consultant who recently retired from the National Center for State Courts (NCSC) where worked for 25 years. During that time he consulted with state and local courts in all 50 of the states. Previously he worked for 15 years in Colorado's Judicial System at Denver Juvenile Court, Boulder Criminal Courts, and as judicial administrator at the 9th Judicial District where he was recently enshrined on their Wall of Honor. Timm is a recognized national expert in court security and for many years was a staff liaison to the Conference of Chief Justices (CCJ), Conference of State Court Administrators (COSCA), and was a member of the United States Marshals Service (USMS) Judicial Advisory Committee. During his career at NCSC, he was the primary author on over 250 courthouse security assessments and nearly 400 reports on court administration.

Mr. Fautsko has served as faculty for the National Judicial College (NJC), National Association of Court Management (NACM), and NCSC's Institute for Court Management (ICM). His many publications on court personal safety and security are recognized and used nationally. Internationally, Timm has consulted with court systems on the rule of law in Canada, Croatia, Italy, the Netherlands, Nigeria, Nepal, Puerto Rico, and Trinidad and Tobago. In December 2010, the NCSC awarded him the coveted Dale A. Sipes Memorial President's Award for excellence in service.

From 1967 thru 1968 he served as a VISTA Volunteer in rural Colorado and soon after was hired by the University of Colorado to conduct pre-service training and placement for volunteers across the country. In 1972, he became the Director of Training for the National Information Center on Volunteerism until 1977 when he joined the Colorado Judicial Department. He earned a Master of Arts degree in 1972 specializing in Human Service Administration from the University of Colorado at Boulder and a Bachelors of Arts degree in English and Business Administration in 1967 from Walsh University in Canton, Ohio. At Walsh he was their first four-year varsity basketball letterman, received the Outstanding Alumnus of the Year award in 1987, and in 2017 was enshrined on the University's *Sports Wall of Fame* for Meritorious

Service. He served a nine-year term on the university's board of directors until 2020. He is a certified mediator and has co-authored several books on problem solving and decision-making.

Sean R. Gibbs

...is Director of Security for the Arizona Judicial Branch in Maricopa County (Greater Phoenix). He was appointed Director in 2016. He leads 182 Security Professionals and is directly responsible for Court security operations and emergency management planning for the Judicial Branch. He's accountable for the implementation of administrative, training, and operational functions critical to maintaining the safety and security of Judicial Officers, employees, court clients, general public and Judicial Branch facilities. He represents the Judicial Branch in discussions and planning sessions regarding all aspects of security and emergency management and ensures that the performance of security personnel provides result-oriented outcomes.

Sean joined the Judicial Branch after a distinguished career in the United States Air Force where he served from 1992 to 2014. A Bronze Star Medal recipient, he retired with the rank of Major after holding numerous operations and security positions; led several combat deployments. Sean has been the Chief of Security or Security Forces Squadron Commander on three different tours. Most recently, as the Chief of Security at Luke Air Force Base, Glendale AZ from 2012 – 2014. During his career, he led and managed three different squadrons totaling 650 military and civilian personnel. Secured \$58 billion in assets and 115,000 personnel communities encompassing 69,000 total acres. Sean has directed base security operations, information security, electronic systems security, law enforcement, investigations, and force protection operations. He has worked directly with the US Secret Service, FBI, Office of Special Investigations, local law enforcement agencies, ATF, Customs/Border Patrol, and Transportation Safety Administration. Managed an annual unit budget and procured funding for security improvement projects. Authored installation security, force protection and information protection plans.

Major Gibbs' principal military awards and decorations include the Bronze Star Medal, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Air Force Commendation Medal with Valor, and Army Commendation Medal with Valor. His deployments and active-duty stations include Op Southern Watch, Saudi Arabia (1997), Op Iraqi Freedom, Kirkuk Iraq (2003), Op Iraqi Freedom, Balad Iraq (2004), Op Ex Iron Falcon, Malaysia (2006), Op Iraqi Freedom, Tallil Iraq (2007), Op Iraqi Freedom, Speicher Iraq (2010), and Joint Task Force Bravo, Honduras (2011)

Nathan Hall

...is a registered Architect and Principal Consultant for the National Center for State Courts. Since joining the National Center in 2008, he has been involved in over 150 court facility and security projects for state and local courts across the nation. His expertise areas include court security, emergency preparedness, and court facility planning and design. Mr. Hall is the staff liaison to the Conference of Chief Justices and Conference of State Court Administrators (CCJ/COSCA) Joint Security and Emergency Preparedness Committee and is the primary editor of the 2016 Steps to Best Practices for Court Building Security published by the NCSC.

At the NCSC, Mr. Hall provides expert consultation and technical assistance to state and local courts, local and county governments, and private industry design firms on courthouse security, emergency preparedness and facility planning/design projects. Mr. Hall has conducted trainings nationwide for court and security professionals regarding court security and courthouse design and has published multiple articles on the subject security and innovation in courthouse planning appearing in the

American Bar Association's Improvement of the Administration of Justice series, Courts Today and in the NCSC Future Trends series.

Previous to his employment at the NCSC, Mr. Hall spent six years as a design project manager for David Wise Architects in Denver, Colorado. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from Lewis and Clark College in Portland, Oregon, and his Master of Architecture degree from the University of Colorado, College of Architecture and Planning.

Hon. Anne Haynie

...is a senior judge with the 30th District Court of Kentucky in Jefferson County (Greater Louisville). She graduated from the Brandies School of Law in 1991. Following graduation, she began her legal career as an Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney where she stayed until being elected a District Court Judge in November 2004.

Since being elected to the District Court bench, Judge Haynie has developed a mediation program for resolution of small claims cases. Additionally, she has developed the protocol for electronic signing of search warrants, saving the police department significant time and money. She has previously served as a Drug Court Judge for eight years.

Judge Haynie previously served as the Chief District Court Judge, for four years, ending January 1, 2021. During her tenure as Chief Judge, she oversaw the reorganization of the entire District Court case processing procedures, both with civil and criminal cases. Additionally, she oversaw all District Court case processing procedures during the pandemic and civil unrest, converting an urban court system into a remote urban court system. She is a member of the Kentucky Bar Association, Louisville Bar Association, Women Lawyer's Association. She previously served as Chair of Presentation Academy's Board of Directors and President of Women Lawyers Association. She also served on the Board of Directors of the Louisville Bar Association, the Board of Trustees for Spalding University, and the Exploited Children's Help Organization.

She has been awarded Judge of the Year by the Louisville Bar Association; the Women Lawyers Association Member of the Year as well as their Lifetime Achievement Award; Kentuckiana's Voice for Crime Victim's Prosecutor of the Year; and the Exploited Children's Help Organization Friend of Children Award.

Judge Haynie is married to Judge Hugh Smith Haynie, who is a Family Court Judge in Jefferson County, Kentucky.

Marcus W. Reinkensmeyer

...is the Director of Court Services for the Administrative Office of the Courts, Supreme Court of Arizona. Previously, he served as the Court Administrator, Chief Deputy Court Administrator and Director of Judicial Information Systems for the Superior Court of Arizona in Maricopa County.

In the State of Illinois, Marcus served as Assistant Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts (Court Services Division), Court Administrator (17th Judicial Circuit), Assistant Superintendent of Juvenile Detention and Probation Officer.

He is a Past President of the National Association for Court Management and the Arizona Courts Association, former Editor of the *Court Manager* and a member of the Editorial Board for the *International*

Association for Court Administration. His articles have appeared in *Judicature*, *The Court Manager*, *Justice System Journal*, *Future Trends in State Courts* and *The Retrospective of Courthouse Design*.

Marcus holds a bachelor's degree from Michigan State University and a Master's degree in Public Administration from Northern Illinois University. He is the recipient of Arizona Supreme Court's Distinguished Service Award, The ICM Award of Merit, the NCSC Warren E. Burger Award and the Justice Management Institute's Ernest C. Friesen Award.

Hon. John J. Russo

... is a senior trial judge with the Court of Common Pleas of Ohio in Cuyahoga County serving the Greater Cleveland metropolitan area. Cuyahoga County is the most populous of Ohio's eighty-eight counties. It is home to 1.2 million people (2010 census). He recently completed a four-year term as the Administrative Judge and Presiding Judge (AJ/PJ) of the Court having been elected unanimously by his 34 colleagues in 2014. As the Court's AJ/PJ he was responsible for appointing committees, coordinating the development of Court policies, and overseeing the four common pleas divisions which include the General, Domestic Relations, Juvenile and Probate Divisions. He had specific responsibilities to administer the dockets in the General Division, the highest-level trial level in the state.

Judge Russo began his career on the Court in 2005. His calendar since then has included felony-level criminal cases and civil cases brought before the court. Prior to assuming the bench, he practiced as a civil and criminal litigator for 12 years as a principal in his own firm, *Polito & Russo LLP*.

Judge Russo also serves as an Adjunct Professor at the Cleveland-Marshall College of Law, a member of various education committees for the Ohio Supreme Court, Ohio Judicial College, Ohio Common Pleas Judges Association, the National Business Institute, National Center for State Courts, and as a faculty member at the St. Edward High School. He was president of NAPCO in 2016 and hosted the First Annual Conference for the Association in Cleveland and was elected as Chair of the Board of Directions in August 2019.

Among his other key achievements, Judge Russo has served as Co-Chair of the Ohio Judicial College, Member of the National Center for State Courts' Trends in State Courts Committee, Chair of the Ohio Lawyers' Fund for Client Protection, Member of the Ohio Supreme Court Death Penalty Task Force, Member of the Public Health Committee of the Supreme Court to re-write the Public Health Policy Bench Book, Chair, Cuyahoga County Security Committee, Trustee of the Cleveland Metropolitan Bar Association, Cleveland-Marshall Law Alumni Association and Westshore Bar Association, and Member of the Ohio Judicial Conference Judicial Ethics and Professionalism Committee.

Judge Russo graduated from John Carroll University in 1987 with a B.S.B.A Degree and from the Cleveland-Marshall College of Law at Cleveland State University in 1992 with a Juris Doctorate Degree.
